Psalm 133

Upon returning from our annual church convention, I cannot help but think about the blessings of being a member of the Body of Christ. David speaks passionately of this fellowship in Psalm 133. However, there is a tendency to think of unity as something for which we must strive, as if this fellowship is achieved by human effort. David teaches us otherwise. He speaks of unity as something that comes from outside of us, as a gift. "It is like the precious ointment upon the head, that ran down upon the beard, even Aaron's beard..." and "...the dew of Hermon..the dew that descended upon the mountains of Zion...." The fellowship we have in Christ Jesus has been bestowed upon us by God, because of His Fatherly kindness. God has given us His Son, so that we might be joined together with Him and with one another. "And, having made peace through the blood of His cross, by Him to reconcile all things unto Himself; by Him, I say, whether they be things in earth, or things in heaven." Colossians 1:20 In his book "Life Together", the German pastor and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer says it well, "Christian community is founded solely on Jesus Christ and in fact, it already exists in Christ. It is not an ideal which we must realize, it is rather a reality created by God in Christ in which we may participate."

Others may say that because we still have differences of opinion, there is no unity. God's Word says otherwise. There is a unity that transcends our human frailties. The Apostle Paul asserts that even though we may be different we are still one in Christ Jesus. "For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body: so also is Christ. ¹³ For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free; and have been all made to drink into one Spirit." I Corinthians 12:12-13 We as God's children enjoy fellowship together, because of the One who shed His blood at Calvary's cross to give us the forgivenss of sins, life and salvation. May God grant us grace to celebrate the unity we have through the person and work of His Son, our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

"And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; ¹² For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ: ¹³ Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ: ¹⁴ That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive; ¹⁵ But speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ: ¹⁶ From whom the whole body fitly joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, according to the effectual working in the measure of every part, maketh increase of the body unto the edifying of itself in love."

The Inter-Lutheran Seminary has created an endowment fund so that our supporters may make gifts that will provide ongoing support to our mission.
